Chinese New Year






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A Time of Love, Fellowship, and Unity

March Break Camps on the Horizon

Three camps will keep NCA hopping during the March Break. The Children's Camp (Mar. 10-12, 10 am-2 pm), sponsored by the Baha'i Community, will include learning about virtues and service in the community through cooperative games, music, and creative projects. The Junior Youth Camp (Mar. 10-14, 10 am-4 pm) will feature two books this year: Walking a Straight Path and Breezes of Confirmation. During the camp, participants will engage with the material to strengthen their literacy, build their power of expression and explore the art of storytelling. They will discuss how these skills can help people serve the community and create agents of change in society, not only in Stratford but anywhere they go. An Institute Camp (March 3rd-7th) will provide an opportunity for students to study the Ruhi Institute material, including Books 1 and 3. Participants will explore the importance of sacred writings and prayer, develop the attitudes needed for those entering on a path of service to humanity, and gain a deeper understanding of the importance of spiritual education for young children. All camps will involve singing, drawing, crafting, going out into the community, games, and serving opportunities for the JY's. NCA students are encouraged to participate in the camps as teachers or animators. Those under 15 are welcome to serve as teachers at the Children's Camp, or they can attend the Junior Youth Camp.
